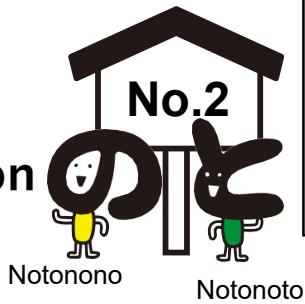


Noto Peninsula Earthquake Support Information Bulletin

What are “Shelters”?

- ▷ No need to pay to stay in them
- ▷ Meals are provided (may not be available at all shelters)
- ▷ Should remain open so long as there is a genuine need for people to stay there

What is “Emergency Temporary Housing”?

- ▷ Housing provided by local government free of charge
- ▷ No meals or home appliances provided (this might vary depending on the local government)
- ▷ As a general rule, residents can use them for two years for the purpose of restoring their lives (please be on the look out for information regarding extension of stay.)

Primary Shelters



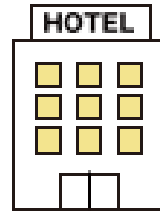
Shelter close to one's home for immediate evacuation

Transitional Shelters



For people who need long-term care or with disabilities who have difficulty staying at a primary shelter

Secondary Shelters



A shelter that uses hotels, inn or nursing homes located in the prefecture or in a nearby prefecture.

Emergency Temporary Housing

Emergency newly built prefab or wooden temporary housing



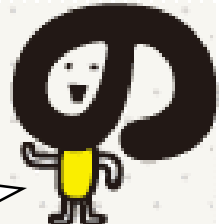
Deemed emergency temporary housing – using existing rental properties such as apartments as emergency temporary housing
